### **RAINBOWS - UNDER TWO YEARS OLD**

Plates and forks at the ready, everyone got involved in exploring and experimenting with the rainbow spaghetti. The children practiced their fine motor skills, and use of the pincer grip and palmer grasp. They focused on purposeful movements to grip, control and release the spaghetti, piling it onto their plates and transferring it to different ones. They used forks to scoop and twirl. We used our senses to observe how the spaghetti wiggled with movements, and some children enjoyed getting stuck in with their hands, squashing and squelching the sticky pasta between their fingers.



## SWANS AND RAINBOWS OVER TWO YEARS OLD



As we grow and during our time at nursery, you may see us engaging in Schematic play.

This happens when babies, toddlers and young children repeat actions or behaviours to explore the world around them and find out how things work.

Through our curiosity and interests, we have been developing our ideas and extending what we already know. Our adults notice what we are exploring and plan stimulating experiences for us to enjoy and learn. We benefit from these opportunities to repeat and practise different actions. For example, actions of up and down, going from side to side and rotating supports early writing development.

There are many exciting schemas that we develop in nursery. You may have seen us exploring these ideas at home too.

**Trajectory** play involves understanding how things move. We may throw objects or investigate the movement of water.

You may have seen us **Transporting** our objects or toys in bags, containers or trucks. We are developing our ideas of moving things around and the different ways in which we can do this.

By engaging in **Connecting** Schematic play, we are observing and noticing how things join, connect and attach together.

We might be seeing our world through different perspectives, in **Orientation** schematic play. We might enjoy turning ourselves or objects upside down, or back to front.

Often, during construction activities we create enclosures. We can design fences and barricades for ourselves and our toys in our block play. This is **Enclosing** Schematic play.

We may be finding excitement in movement that goes round and round. That might be ourselves, twirling and twisting or the wheels on our vehicles. We are finding fascination with the idea of **Rotation**.

Can you see me? We are enjoying hiding or covering ourselves with materials. Through wrapping objects, teddies and dolls in paper or blankets, we will be exploring our ideas of **Enveloping**.

Through these types of play, we are continuing to think creatively with curiosity and with the motivation to find things out and learn more about our world

### **FOREST SCHOOL UPDATE**



This term, we've introduced the children to Forest School; an exciting and engaging way to explore the outdoors and connect with the natural world. Through a gentle introduction, the children have started to become familiar with our woodland setting and the Forest School approach, which encourages curiosity, exploration, and hands-on learning.

Next term, we'll build on this foundation with more opportunities to develop confidence and skills in the outdoors. The children will take part in a range of activities such as climbing, balancing, swinging, collecting, building and bug hunting; all designed to support their physical development, observation skills, and understanding of the natural environment.

We'll also be involving the children in looking after our site. Through simple maintenance tasks, they'll learn how to care for the woods and begin to understand what it means to be environmentally responsible.

Forest School is all about fostering a connection with nature, building resilience, and encouraging a sense of wonder, and we're very much looking forward to seeing how the children continue to grow in this space.
